# PLANNING CONTINUES FOR LIFESPAN LEARNING ACTIVITIES

The June 2 meeting of the Lifespan Learning Committee drew 14 interested and active members who suggested, discussed and developed plans for events and activities for children and adults. Below is the thorough report of the meeting. Remember that meetings are open to all, with the next meeting scheduled for July 7, 2024, following the Sunday Service.

And please, if you have any questions, suggestions or concerns, Susan Kaphammer would be glad to hear from you!

#### KIDS' ROOM:

Susan Kaphammer began the meeting asking for what is going well. Parents who have brought their children reported they, "Love the room for kids." Their kids like it, toys and materials have been good, and the parents like being able to see through the window.

Suggestions for the kids' room include possibly switching it with one of the two rooms further back because of concern with the noise and disturbance with the room nearer to the front of our meeting area. Susan explained that the other two rooms are slightly smaller, which is the main reason the current room was chosen. Also mentioned was using reflective material on the window that allowed adults to see in but kids not to see out. No action was taken on these suggestions.

Additional input included: interruptions from children are part of community; it must bother some people as it keeps coming up; and some people have difficulty hearing. Reserving seating by the window to the room was suggested and will be tried.

We discussed having adult supervision in the room. The parents talked about rotating to provide this supervision. This will be up to them.

#### RELIGIOUS PROGRAMMING FOR CHILDREN:

Parents are very interested religious programming for kids. Irene Goetz, Jessica Blair and Aurora Walker are willing to work together to develop kids' programming.

One suggestion is holding a regularly scheduled family night for kids and parents, perhaps with time for parents together while kids are involved in class/activities.

Discussion led to the decision to plan a week long, half day program in the summer for children. Play, activities and lessons on UU concepts may be included. Denise Edwards and Jen Berry will work together on a program to run from July 29 - August 2

#### TECHNICAL ACCESS AND PR:

The desire for providing zoom access and better tech in general was discussed. Jen Berry indicated willingness to work on streaming via zoom.

Several people spoke to the need to reach out so the larger community is aware of what we are doing. Rosemary mentioned that the church has wanted but so far not been able to identify someone to be point person for PR. Irene Goetz volunteered to be a social media public relations person. Efforts would need to be coordinated with our office administrator, Hannah Born, who has some responsibilities for this in her job description. Since this goes beyond the scope of just the Lifespan Learning Committee, the Board will be involved. Rosemary plans to contact Irene and if possible, Irene will attend next board meeting – Monday, June 10, 2024, 4 p.m. at UUCY. Follow-up Note: Rosemary brought the issue to the Board; Irene was unable to attend. The first step will be to identify Hannah's responsibilities then see how our online presence can be enhanced. It will come up again at the July Board Meeting.

#### **ADULT LEARNING AND ACTIVITIES:**

Susan Kaphammer reported that results from the interest survey taken at our May meeting indicated a high level of interest in, "What is Unitarian Universalism?" perhaps incorporating history, definitions and organizations. Suki Smaglik and Linda King will work together on a UU curriculum for fall, 2024. Evening and weekends were identified as good meeting time.

A suggestion for an adult activity is scheduling of a Brewery Night - possibly once a month. This would provide an informal discussion opportunity in addition to the weekly Coffee Time that precludes most working adults since it is at 9 AM on Wednesdays.

#### **ADDITIONAL SUGGESTIONS AND COMMENTS:**

Listing Sunday Service songs in the Thursday updates would allow people to practice ahead of time. This will be referred to the Sunday Services Committee, but will be on-hold until full services resume in the Fall.

Schedule a general support group for all ages for discussion/sharing. Idea will be held for future consideration.

Participation and information about Social Justice – perhaps a discussion/support group. Carol Sahlstrand said the Social Justice Committee is beginning to meet again and will she will tell Phil Dindia, Chair of that committee, of the interest expressed in the Lifespan Learning meeting.

We'll be talking about, "A bewitching novel...Strange, enchanting and funny..." by popular and award-winning novelist, Louise Erdrich. Copies are available in print, electronic and Large Print editions from the Yakima Valley Libraries, and from Inklings Bookshop with a book club discount.

#### The Sentence by Louise Erdrich. 2021. 400 pages.

In this stunning and timely novel, Pulitzer Prize and National Book Award-winning author Louise Erdrich creates a wickedly funny ghost story, a tale of passion, of a complex marriage, and of a woman's relentless error. Louise Erdrich's latest novel, The Sentence, asks what we owe to the living, to the dead, to the reader and to the book.


