# Perspectives from UUCY President...

## **BUSY TIMES THIS SUMMER AT UUCY**

I promised to use my monthly UniFire columns to highlight our congregation's activities and successes. While it is common for congregations to experience some summer slowdowns in activities and energy, UUCY is going the opposite way!

For the first time in several years, UUCY Lifespan Learning is offering this week a series of experiences for young people. Several newer members along with Oksana Edwards and with assistance from Denise Edwards are conducting a week-long morning "camp," called Discovery School: Getting to Know YoUU! Anticipated attendees from toddlers to twelve years old join in activities, crafts, snacks, and general fun from July 29 through August 2.

Our summer services are presented in a "Coffee and Conversation" format that provides for sharing thoughts around a selected topic. We've kept some rituals including our traditional Chalice Lighting and Extinguishing the Flame, reciting our Covenant for Right Relations, sharing Joys and Concerns, and, of course, passing the collection. But the rest of the time is for informal talking, listening and learning among those attending. I am happy to report that we are experiencing robust attendance, totaling over 30 some Sundays! But we will always make room for more around the tables, so keep coming or consider checking us out at 10 AM on Sundays. See the first page of this UniFire for the upcoming topics.

At our July 11 meeting, the board noted the success of our auction fundraiser with net income of \$4400, which exceeded our target. In addition, the auction offered an enjoyable social event for members, friends and guests, with cheerful conversations around the tables between bidding. It was social event fundraisers that brought in the most money, so the conviviality of the auction carries on at dinners, barbeques and the like throughout the coming year. Thanks to Nancy Born for all of her work in making the auction happen. Consider stepping up to take the lead or help for our auction next spring. And remember, it is an event not to be missed!

The board considered questions raised at the annual meeting. Regarding the hiring of a minister, our current income would not meet the significant expense of professional ministry, even part-time, and would require siphoning money from our building fund. The Board is not aware of a strong desire for a minister at this time or a clear consensus of priority between a minister or a purchased space.

Also raised at the annual meeting was the status of the New Home Task Force. The board acknowledged that increased attendance is challenging our current space, especially for programs for children. UUCY is in the middle of a three-year lease for our current space, set to expire May 2026. A lease can be terminated early but likely with extra cost. The previous Task Force had not found a suitable space for purchase, and the current real estate market does not seem favorable to finding something. The board voted to table establishing a formal New Home task force until September 2025. But members are encouraged to keep an eye out for possibilities, gather information about any options and let the board know.

Our active Social Justice Committee recommends choosing a new recipient organization to receive a portion of our non-pledge Sunday giving for our Share the Plate program. The board asks the committee to recommend organizations, and all members are invited to submit ideas. A vote by the congregation will be held the first Sunday of October.

As you can tell, UUCY has THINGS GOING ON! Let's continue with joy in our community! Susan Kaphammer

### SOCIAL JUSTICE COMMITTEE

We will ask the Association of Faith Ministries, of which the UUCY is a part, to join us.

#### BETWEEN THE RIDGES

The chair, Rev. David Hacker, will return from a three-month sabbatical in August. Upon his return the fundraising dinner will be scheduled. At the July meeting, we aligned ourselves with efforts to defeat the four initiatives against repeal of the climate action enacted by the state legislature.

I would like to propose a family weekend, Friday to Monday - days off from work and school, a time to celebrate the wonder and vastness of our family. My wife and I can see, hear and join with relatives on the East Coast from New York to Washington, D.C., and Florida. And on the West Coast - San Francisco, Los Angeles, Tiburon, Fresno, Santa Rosa, Stockton, all in California, and in Italy, both in Florence and Sicily. We connect and join once in a while - a visit, a phone call, a card or letter. There's blood there, specialness, ours.

### Book Club Selection Offers Compassionate Look At Race, Adoption and Families in General

We'll be sharing insights and reactions from the celebrated memoir by Nicole Chung, termed, "vital reading for anyone who has ever struggled to figure out where they belong."


Copies are available in print, electronic and Large Print editions from the Yakima Valley Libraries, and from Inklings Bookshop with a book club discount.

All You Can Ever Know: A Memoir by Nicole Chung. 2019. 256 pages.

Nicole Chung was born severely premature, placed for adoption by her Korean parents, and raised by a white family in a sheltered Oregon town. From childhood, she heard the story of her adoption as a comforting, prepackaged myth. She believed that her biological parents had made the ultimate sacrifice in the hope of giving her a better life, that forever feeling slightly out of place was her fate as a transracial adoptee.

But as Nicole grew up—facing prejudice her adoptive family couldn't see, finding her identity as an Asian American and as a writer, becoming ever more curious about where she came from—she wondered if the story she'd been told was the whole truth.

With warmth, candor, and startling insight, Nicole Chung tells of her search for the people who gave her up, which coincided with the birth of her own child. *All You Can Ever Know* is a profound, moving chronicle of surprising connections and the repercussions of unearthing painful family secrets.
