October 6: Why Atheists Come to Church

We ask all to come with open hearts as we turn to ourselves to share more about our UU journeys and what has brought each of us here!

October 20: UUs and Jesus (with Phil Dindia)

Join us today as Phil leads us in some discussions around Jesus. What are your thoughts about Jesus? Phil will nudge us with some considerations: Does Jesus need to be re-thought, re-imagined, re-engaged? Is there a way to talk about Jesus without minimizing him or his message? Is Jesus to be adored? Prayed to? Coming again? How important is Jesus to our history? What was your history with Jesus— and now, today?

October 27: Why We Light the Chalice (with Lucy Ann Valderhaug)

Did you know that UU's have a martyr? His name is Michael Servetus. Lucy will draw from her readings about the Reformation, Michael Servetus, Martin Luther, the printing press and John Calvin. It was a time of political back and forth; a revolution where Servetus was looking critically at the holy trinity and more – none of it making sense to him. Intrigue and treachery led to Servetus being burned alive at Champel.

All of Servetus' questioning, searching resonated with Lucy, and why questions and why UU's question. Join us today as we learn more about this early martyr, as we seek answers to all those questions inside us.

Perspectives from UUCY President...

VALUES AND PRINCIPLES ANCHOR OUR DENOMINATION AND OUR CONGREGATION

Article II of the Unitarian Universalist Association constitution has been revised in a multi-year process, with the revised version adopted at this year's UUA General Assembly. Excerpts include: "Congregational Freedom and the individual's right of conscience are central to our Unitarian Universalist heritage... Congregations may establish statements of purpose, covenants, and bonds of union so long as they do not require that members adhere to a particular creed." These foundational principles of congregational freedom and individual rights allow for a wide variety of beliefs and practices by members and congregations, but not 'anything goes.'

What anchors and defines us as members and congregations are our Shared Values. From Article II: We draw from our heritages of freedom, reason, hope, and courage... Love is the power that hold us together and is at the center of our shared values." Shared Unitarian Universalist Values are inseparable and deeply interdependent as represented in this graphic.

The previous, and to most members the more familiar, version of Article II contains what is commonly known to as "The Seven Principles." As listed in the front of our hymnals:

Unitarian Universalist congregations affirm and promote:

The inherent worth and dignity of every person.

Justice, equity and compassion in human relations.


Acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations.

A free and responsible search for truth and meaning.

The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large.

The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all,

Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part.



As individuals and as a congregation we are free to notice, adopt or incorporate either statement of values and principles, or both, however they help our spiritual understandings, practices and growth. They are among the tools we have, as quoted on the home page at UUA.org, to "Live your values aloud, not alone. Our open-minded, open-hearted spiritual communities help people lead lives of justice, love, learning and hope."

Whew... That's my lesson for this newsletter. I hope the information enriches our understandings of our denomination. Now to local considerations....

UUCY benefits from the contributions of many "unsung heroes" – those people who quietly, competently and often without notice contribute their time and talents to help out where needed. We can be proud that our UUCY "home," as limited as it is, provided a valuable community connection. On Monday, September 23, we hosted a get-out-the-vote letter writing event for the organization, Vote Forward. Over 32 people gathered for two hours and wrote over 700 letters encouraging people to vote! At least one more such event may be held before the election. This, and our own UUCY effort, organized by our Social Justice Committee, to write postcards to voters in swing states are direct actions promoting "the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large." We realize that values and principles are only words until they are matched by our actions.

Discussions and actions by your Board of Trustees at our September meeting included identifying how to manage many of the tasks normally done by Scott Holman while he recovers from a serious hand injury. Board members are taking on some of the tasks including clean-up and vacuuming. We owe them our appreciation.

The board also gave their OK for volunteers to rearrange two of our small rooms, the kitchen and storeroom. Many thanks to those who worked -- Debra, Susan, Jen, Kia, Linda, Rick and Rosemary -- for several hours to clean up and organize our spaces. We now have a meditation/meeting room in addition to storage to make a space for our meditation group. New since our move here and open to all, the meditators meet after services most Sundays.


March by Geraldine Brooks. 2006. 320 pages.
