January 5: The Practice of Story

January 26: Universalism

The Unitarians and the Universalists merged in 1961 to form the UUA -- the Unitarian-Universalist Association, of which we are a part. The Unitarians were the bigger of the two, and it sometimes seems like the Universalists have become UUA's ugly stepchild. But the ideas that gave rise to Universalism (originally a Christian sect) are important not only to Christian-leaning UUs, but also to those of us who identify as secular humanists. Indeed, your UUCY board, committees, and individual members take actions small and large that move us to more fully embody our mission: We celebrate community and promote spirituality, justice, responsibility, and compassion.

UUCY is not all it could be; we will never achieve some endpoint to say, "Now we are happy." But that is not the point. We are, right now, active and whole and meaningful for members, friends, newcomers. Note that fifty-nine -- 59!! -- individuals of all ages gathered for our Christmas Eve service. The laughter and listening, the singing and the quiet reflection of candlelight was our gift to ourselves and others.

Our UUCY path, originating in the 1950s, stretches before us. Let us be open to the happiness abundant on our path at every step, and take this joy and strength to continue enriching the hearts, minds, and lives of all we touch.

At our December board meeting, the newly revived membership committee shared preliminary plans to help strengthen our welcome for visitors as well as assuring a smooth process of greeting attendees to our services. The committee welcomes anyone interested. Thank you, Lana Barnes and Jen Berry for your thoughtful, enthusiastic efforts.

The Board also discussed Zooming our Sunday Services. Tentative plans are to do a trial videoing of the first service in January. If all goes well, we can begin making the services available for members and friends over Zoom. Watch the weekly update, usually emailed on Thursdays, for the Zoom link. For now, services

will only be provided to view at the same time they happen; they will not be recorded or posted. Anyone with questions or concerns about attending services and perhaps being visible on Zoom can opt-out of permission for being filmed by calling the office.

The Board also adopted facility use procedures. First priority is for UUCY programs and events. The building can also be scheduled by church members for life celebrations and by groups that promote the mission and values of UUCY as long as at least one UUCY member belongs to the group. In all cases, a UUCY member must attend and be responsible for leaving the facility as found and securing the doors. No fees will be charged, but donations will be accepted.

- Register for specific Learning Circle(s). Meeting dates & times vary.
- Everyone is given the opportunity to share reactions, then discuss as a group
- We ask that you plan to attend all sessions so we can build bonds of trust and insight



HISTORICAL FICTION SET IN EASTERN OREGON FOR JANUARY BOOK CLUB DISCUSSION

The November gathering of our UUCY book club, facilitated by our new leaders, Gean Dindia and Rosemary Saul, was a small but lively group engaged in discussion of the award-winning historical fiction book *March* by Geraldine Brooks, which offered a different perspective on the family of *Little Women*.

The next book takes us to eastern Oregon in the winter of 1917. Award-winning author Molly Gloss' *The Hearts of Horses* is an elegant, heartwarming story about the profound connections between people and animals.
