## Perspectives from UUCY President...

### WE CELEBRATE COMMUNITY

"Community" is a central tenet of Unitarian Universalism and leads in our congregational mission statement. We are called, however, not just to simple community, not just to being together in appreciation of our like-mindedness. Rather we are called to create and expand "beloved community." This goes beyond being to doing.

As beloved community we come together with our whole selves – our kindness, our beliefs, our troubles, our doubts, our generosity, our weariness, our joys and, always, our love! Our love calls us to participate in and strengthen our congregation as we practice our covenant of kindness, support, deep listening, courageous and humble speaking, and shared ministry, "that we might touch deeper springs and be renewed." (Kirk D Loadman-Copeland from *Worship Web.*) Even more, beloved community challenges us to go further; "it calls us to practice our values beyond the limitations of Sunday mornings in the sanctuary." At UUCY we have many opportunities to experience community and build beloved community within our congregation and out in our larger world. Various activities provide for learning, planning, ministering and, of course, fun and satisfaction.

## Opportunities include:

<u>Adult Lifespan Learning</u>: Various programs and workshops will be offered throughout the active church year. The next, "Stories of Our Lives" workshop, tentatively scheduled for February, 2025, will provide time and structure for introspection and sharing. Linda King is currently leading this effort.

<u>Aesthetics Committee</u>: Group of members addressing appearance and ambiance of our physical space. They meet online under the leadership of Andrew Whitmont.

**Book Group**: Meets bi-monthly to discuss a shared reading from a variety of genres. Next gathering will be Thursday, December 12, at 5:30 p.m. at church. Rosemary Saul and Gean Dindia are leading the group.

<u>Chalice Circles</u>: A series of weekly small group meetings to share in understanding and deepening our engagement with spiritual topics. Next session will be scheduled after the first of the year, under the direction of Gean Dindia.

<u>Children's Programs</u>: In addition to inviting children's participation in a portion of our services, special activities are planned the first Sunday of the month, facilitated by the parents.

<u>Circle Suppers</u>: Casual gatherings in individuals' homes for food and conversation. Currently inactive, but may be scheduled in the next few months.

# LIFESPAN LEARNING FOR ADULTS Starting Point from Soul Matters

Adult religious education is usually enlightening and worthwhile with an element of fun as well. But this particular Starting Point journey at this particular time in our lives, in our church life, and the life of our nation was truly outstanding!

Anywhere from 14 – 18 amazing, diverse and friendly people met weekly for four weeks to examine our individual and collective spiritual journeys – past, present and future. Participants' ability to be honest, reflective, and vulnerable made this a journey of connection – with much laughter, some tears, wonderful snacks and so much fun!

Many thanks to all the participants, who took time to show up each week, to do preparation work prior to each class, who listened deeply to others and spoke with courage and humility as they shared thoughts, experiences, sorrows, joys and more.

#### We found that:

- \* Sharing personal journeys deepens our connections to one another.
- \* The history of UU, UUCY and self not only provide a solid footing but also a recognition of work that still needs to be done in our evolving faith.
  - \* There are three types of relationships: to self, to life and to others.
- \* There are three practices: listening to our deepest self, opening to life's gifts and serving needs greater than our own.

We learned to listen with these thoughts in mind:

- \* Hold still until others have spoken, hold at bay unhelpful comments, hold up gratitude for something shared that struck us, and hold out how it deepened our own understanding.
  - \* No fixing, no saving, no advising, no setting each other straight.

And as a bonus, some members of the class made plans to revive the membership committee and Circle Suppers as a way of deepening connections and "serving needs other than our own."

A quote from Annie Dillard shared at the last session:

"When people come to church they should not be handed an order of service with a smile, but should be given hard hats and life preservers, because church should be a dangerous place, a zone of risk, a place of new birth and new life, where we confront ourselves with who we truly are and who the church is calling us to become."



# HISTORICAL FICTION SET IN EASTERN OREGON FOR JANUARY BOOK CLUB DISCUSSION

The November gathering of our UUCY Book Club, facilitated by our new leaders, Gean Dindia and Rosemary Saul, was a small but lively group engaged in discussion of the award-winning historical fiction book *March* by Geraldine Brooks, which offered a different perspective on the family of *Little Women*.

The next book takes us to Eastern Oregon in the winter of 1917. Award-winning author Molly Gloss' *The Hearts of Horses* is an elegant, heartwarming story about the profound connections between people and animals.
